 - FLY student who exhibited exemplary leadership skills and volunteered for at least (5) FLY activities per Section D.

2. FLY Scholarship Eligibility Criteria, Terms and Conditions

Nominator: A mentor or tutor from TEC-FLY or a leader/teacher or a coach from a school, organization or association, community, sports club or any other private or not-for-profit entity.

- 1) A nominator must support student applicants.
- 2) The nominator has determined that the nominated student is on track to complete the 2022-2023 school year.
- 3) The nominator has determined that the nominated student will likely enrol for the 2023-2024 school year and will likely pursue or complete post-secondary education.
- 4) The student applicant **MUST meet ONE of the following FLY participation criteria per H.1:**
 - a) **Award Category 1: FLY Activity Participant**
 - b) **Award Category 2: Student-Athlete**
 - c) **Award Category 3: Best FLY Peer Student Tutor or Mentor**



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- 5) To ensure meeting the FLY Project objectives, the FLY team will award the \$1000 scholarship in two (2) terms:
 - 1st \$500 cheque – between March and June 2023
 - 2nd \$500 cheque – on or before July 31, 2023
